Dear Senator Skinner

I am writing to you on behalf of the Peace and Freedom Party of California to support SB 776. For over 50 years we have supported electoral justice for those who are incarcerated as well as those who have been released back into society. We are in support of this effort to help people re-enter society and improve their lives after their release from jail or prison.

This bill would prohibit post-secondary educational institutions from inquiring about a person's criminal history during the initial admission process. It is well known that such initial questions can be a significant deterrent to acceptance, or even being seriously considered. This impediment to rehabilitation needs to be eliminated.

For these and other reasons, Peace and Freedom Party of California, State Central Committee voted on March 23, 2019, to support AB 32. We will do what we can to help pass this bill.
